He is responsible for coordinating horticultural educational outreach to the public and coordinates the Master Gardener Volunteer and Training Program. He also manages the display gardens at the Extension office. He also continues teaching Florida-Friendly Landscaping [™] as he has done since 2003 when he started working for the University of Florida in Gainesville, in Lee County in 2004 and Charlotte County in 2014.

Tom completed Florida-Friendly Landscaping[™] Professional Certification in 2020 and accredited professional certification for the design and installation of Florida Water StarTM landscapes in 2017. He has been an Extension horticulture educator for 35 years. He

moved to Florida from Pennsylvania in 2003. In 2004, Tom briefly served as the Florida Yard and Neighborhoods Builder and Developer state coordinator in the UF/IFAS environmental horticulture department. Tom served as a food harvest ambassador with an international team of researchers and educators during the EPCOT Walt Disney World Flower and Garden Festival. Mike has been a certified arborist with the International Society of Arborists for 19 years and directs the county's tree trimmer licensing, pesticide application and Green Industry Best Management Practices (GI-BMP) certification programs. In 2009, his Extension program received the Outstanding Public Educational Program award from the Florida Urban Forestry Council (FUFC). In 2011, Mike was named Florida Nursery Growers & Landscapers Association Outstanding Educator. Marco is an assistant professor, turfgrass research and Extension specialist in turfgrass, water conservation, drought and salinity management at the UF/IFAS Fort Lauderdale Research and Extension Center. He is in charge of the turfgrass science research and Extension programs. Other UF/IFAS research, Extension and teaching programs offered at the center: aquatic plant management, entomology and nematology, environmental horticulture, plant pathology, palm management and wildlife ecology and conservation. He had worked prior at the department of botany and plant sciences at the University of California at Riverside, conducting research in agronomy, horticulture, and environmental science.

Michael Parsons is a professor of marine science at Florida Gulf Coast University and director of FGCU's Vester Marine and Environmental Science Research Field Station. He was appointed to the Blue-Green Algae Task Force by Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis in 2019. Michael has built a successful research career, receiving over \$20 million of extramural funding to study ciguatera fish poisoning, harmful algal blooms, coral reef ecology and phytoplankton ecology. His funding includes the recently funded Greater Caribbean Center for Ciguatera Research, funded through the Centers for Oceans and Human Health Program by the National Science Foundation and National Institutes of Health. He is also a collaborator in three Gulf of Mexico Research Initiative Consortia, studying the impacts of the Macondo oil spill on coastal ecosystems in multiyear projects worth over \$30 million. At Florida Gulf Coast University, he teaches courses on marine ecology and data collection and analysis.
